Last month the newsletter included items for the Blue Star Mother's packages. This month we are including items for **Hospitalized Vets and items for the USO Club Care Packages.**

MARKED "HOSPITAL"

Tide Laundry Detergent ONLY (small boxes to store in hospital rooms), large bath sheet towels (solid colors only), swiffer refill pads, Albertson's gift cards (this store is within walking distance of the hospital), Outback Steakhouse gift cards, Best Buy Gift Cards, hooded sweatshirts M,L,XL,2XL sizes, CDs and handheld electronic games and cartridges, batteries of all sizes, athletic T-shirts (no sleeves – gray or black, all sizes), new outer wear T-shirts (not underwear) all sizes, zip-up hooded sweatshirts (gray or black all sizes), 120 minute prepaid phone cards, DVDs, puzzle books, cards of encouragement – marked "injured Vet".

USO PACKAGES – These packages are given to U. S. Troops passing through USO's at LAX, Ontario, Palm Springs, and John Wayne Airports. Items are placed in a quart size zip-top plastic bag and each care package must include the following items: Toothbrush, travel size shampoo (3 oz. or less), travel size conditioner (3 oz. or less), travel size bar of soap, disposable razor, pack of gum, travel size wipes, and deck of cards. Cards and letters of encouragement are also appreciated.

Message from Sharon Dorin - If every member would write two short notes to two soldiers, they would really appreciate it. Cut out the fronts of Christmas cards and write a brief note. If you have trouble starting, Sharon can suggest the following: Dear Soldier: Thank you for serving our country. You are a hero........... Torrance Memorial Festival of Trees Barbara Freeman


